What you *ought* to say might well be rendered 'what you must say'. Jesus is concerned with the duty that rests compellingly on believers even in such a time of danger. He is not telling them how to secure acquittal. He is telling them how they may best serve God in their trying situation. a.	<b>Specific</b> : a promise to the in their imminent need for direct revelation in the time before they had the completed Bible and before they had the indwelling of the Holy Spirit. (Acts 4:8-13					
b.	Future: God gives a similar promise to believers, who will face even more intense persecution for Jesus' sake. God will provide wisdom and the ability to speak in a way that cannot be contradicted or resisted. (Luke 21:14-15, 21:11-22; cf Mt 10:16-24; Mk 13:4-30)					
c.	<b>Principle</b> : In critical situations, God may give He desires more direct, specific help beyond the commands and principles of the Word. If God allows you to be placed in this situation for Jesus' sake, He will help you!
