## An Outline of Deuteronomy:

Deuteronomy – "Second Law" - comes from the Septuagint translation of "a copy of this law" from 17:18. But it is not a another (second) law, but a reiteration of the law given at Mt. Sinai.

The Hebrew name is D'Bareem, which comes from the Hebrew word for words, from "These are the words..." (Deut. 1:1).

Deuteronomy is a record of Moses' last address to the nation of Israel before his death. It consists of three speeches or sermons to the children of Israel and happened over a period of about one month. The first sermon reviews what God has already done for Israel. The second sermon reviews the laws that God had given to the first generation of the Exodus, who died in the wilderness. The final sermon tells of what God is about to do and prepares the way for Joshua to replace Moses as the leader of the nation.

Deuteronomy is sited more than 80 times in 17 of the New Testament books, including when Christ responds to Satan during His temptation in the wilderness (Matt. 4)

1.	Turn the stone into bread – Deut
2.	Throw Yourself down from the pinnacle of the temple – Deut
3.	Worship the Devil – Deut

One key theme in Deuteronomy is "beware lest you forget." The teaching of Moses in this book follows that if Israel prospers, it is God who caused it and when they disobey, God will discipline them.
