11 Now <b>Heber</b> the Kenite, [Heber "an ally"] of the children of Hobab the father-in-law of Moses, had separated himself from the Kenites and pitched his tent near the terebinth tree at Zaanaim, which is beside Kedesh.	<ul> <li>2.
