### SIX SCENES FROM THE TRUE CHRISTMAS:

## Scene #3: God Guides the Circumstances for Jesus' Birth (Luke 2:1-5)

#### **OBSERVATIONS:**

### 1. SOVEREIGNTY – God Controls Circumstances

- a. **Prov 21:1** The king's heart *is* in the hand of the Lord, *Like* the rivers of water; He turns it wherever He wishes.
- b. **Dan 4:25** They shall drive you from men, your dwelling shall be with the beasts of the field, and they shall make you eat grass like oxen. They shall wet you with the dew of heaven, and seven times shall pass over you, till you know that the Most High rules in the kingdom of men, and gives it to whomever He chooses.
- c. **Dan 4:35** All the inhabitants of the earth *are* reputed as nothing; He does according to His will in the army of heaven And *among* the inhabitants of the earth. No one can restrain His hand Or say to Him, "What have You done?"

### 2. GOVERNMENT – God Uses Government to Accomplish His Work

- a. Gen 9:6 "Whoever sheds man's blood, By man his blood shall be shed; For in the image of God He made man.
- b. **Pharoah & Joseph Gen 41:28** This *is* the thing which I have spoken to Pharaoh. God has shown Pharaoh what He *is* about to do. **Gen 45:7-8** And God sent me before you to preserve a posterity for you in the earth, and to save your lives by a great deliverance. So now *it was* not you *who* sent me here, but God; and He has made me a father to Pharaoh, and lord of all his house, and a ruler throughout all the land of Egypt.
- c. **Daniel & Cyrus Isa 44:28** Who says of Cyrus, '*He is* My shepherd, And he shall perform all My pleasure, Saying to Jerusalem, "You shall be built," And to the temple, "Your foundation shall be laid." '
- d. **Rom 13:1** Let every soul be subject to the governing authorities. For there is no authority except from God, and the authorities that exist are appointed by God.

# 3. DIFFICULTY – God Allows Difficulty in Our Lives to Accomplish His Work

- Scorn A lifetime in the midst of supposed scandal (did Joseph relocate to lessen this?)
- b. **Travel** 85-90 miles of travel, without a car, while pregnant (15 miles/day = 5-6 days to a month!)

# 4. PROPHECY/CERTAINTY – God Insured that Prophecy Was Fulfilled Regarding Jesus

- a. **Micah 5:2** "But you, Bethlehem Ephrathah, *Though* you are little among the thousands of Judah, *Yet* out of you shall come forth to Me The One to be Ruler in Israel, Whose goings forth *are* from of old, From everlasting."
- b. Jeremiah 31:15 Thus says the Lord: "A voice was heard in Ramah, Lamentation and bitter weeping, Rachel weeping for her children, Refusing to be comforted for her children, Because they are no more."
- c. Ruth 4:11 And all the people who were at the gate, and the elders, said, "We are witnesses. The LORD make the woman who is coming to your house like Rachel and Leah, the two who built the house of Israel; and may you prosper in Ephrathah and be famous in Bethlehem.
- d. **1 Sam 17:12** Now David *was* the son of that Ephrathite of Bethlehem Judah, whose name *was* Jesse, and who had eight sons. And the man was old, advanced *in years*, in the days of Saul.

- e. 1 Sam 17:15 But David occasionally went and returned from Saul to feed his father's sheep at Bethlehem.
- f. **Matthew 2:4-6** <sup>4</sup> And when he had gathered all the chief priests and scribes of the people together, he inquired of them where the Christ was to be born. <sup>5</sup> So they said to him, "In Bethlehem of Judea, for thus it is written by the prophet: <sup>6</sup> 'But you, Bethlehem, in the land of Judah, Are not the least among the rulers of Judah; For out of you shall come a Ruler Who will shepherd My people Israel.' "
- g. **John 7:42** Has not the Scripture said that the Christ comes from the seed of David and from the town of Bethlehem, where David was?"

Quirinius served as governor of the Roman province of Syria twice (3-2 B.C. and 6–7 A.D.). However, Herod the Great was still alive when Augustus issued his decree (Matt. 2), and Herod died in 4 B.C. This incongruity has cast doubt on Luke's reliability as a historian. There is evidence that Augustus issued the type of decree that Luke described in 6 A.D. However there is presently no evidence that he did so earlier.

One solution to this problem is that the decree went out in 3 or 2 B.C., but we have no other record of it. This solves the problem of a census occurring during the governorship of Quirinius, but it does not solve the problem of Herod being alive then. Another possibility is that the word "first" (v. 2, Gr. prote) means "prior" or "former" here (cf. John 15:18). Luke's meaning would then be that the census that took Mary and Joseph to Bethlehem was the one Augustus made prior to the one he took when Quirinius was governor of Syria (in 6 A.D.). This seems to be the best solution. All the evidence points to the birth of Jesus in late 5 or early 4 B.C. <sup>2</sup>
