Sin Spreads, and God Continues His Plan to Rescue People and to Solve Sin (Genesis 4:17-26)

There are many details in Genesis 4:17-26 that we are simply not focusing on at present (Cain's location, Cain's wife, his building of a city, the activities of his descendants). We will likely return and touch upon

so	ne of them later when they are more pertinent. For now, just focus on the two major points below.		
SIN: The Problem Continues and Expands			
1.	Sin began in the (Gen 3:1-7)		
	Gen 2:16-17 $-$ <sup>16</sup> And the LORD God commanded the man, saying, "Of every tree of the garden you may freely eat; <sup>17</sup> "but of the tree of the knowledge of good and evil you shall not eat, for in the day that you eat of it you shall surely die."		
	Gen 3:6-7 $^{-6}$ So when the woman saw that the tree <i>was</i> good for food, that it <i>was</i> pleasant to the eyes, and a tree desirable to make <i>one</i> wise, she took of its fruit and ate. She also gave to her husband with her, and <b>he ate</b> . Then the eyes of both of them were opened, and they knew that they <i>were</i> naked; and they sewed fig leaves together and made themselves coverings.		
2.	Sin on right away, as shown in the (Gen 4:6-8)		
	Gen 4:6-8 $^{-6}$ So the LORD said to Cain, "Why are you angry? And why has your countenance fallen? $^{7}$ "If you do well, will you not be accepted? And if you do not do well, sin lies at the door. And its desire <i>is</i> for you, but you should rule over it." $^{8}$ Now Cain talked with Abel his brother; and it came to pass, when they were in the field, that Cain rose up against Abel his brother and killed him.		
	Cain was a sinner because sin passed down from Adam, the first sinner.		
	Rom $5:12 - ^{12}$ Therefore, just as through one man sin entered the world, and death through sin, and thus death spread to all men, because all sinned—		
	Right away sin was fully present. People didn't need many generations or lots of time to grow sinful. They also didn't need bad teaching, a bad neighborhood, or anything else to make them sinful. Cain, because he was a sinner and refused God's help, was able to murder his brother, Abel. Sin damages our hearts (makes them sinful), and all sin comes out of our hearts (because we come from Adam).		
	Jer 17:9 $^{-9}$ "The heart <i>is</i> deceitful above all <i>things</i> , And desperately wicked; Who can know it?		
	Matt $15:18-19 - ^{18}$ "But those things which proceed out of the mouth come from the heart, and they defile a man. $^{19}$ "For out of the heart proceed evil thoughts, murders, adulteries, fornications, thefts, false witness, blasphemies.		
3.	Sin as time goes on. (Gen 4:17-24)		

As there are more people that are born on the earth (at least 7 generations now, counting Adam), all of those people have the same sin-infected hearts, and some sin terribly. One is a g-g-g-g-g grandson of Cain, called Lamech. He shows that sin is still alive and well by doing even worse, going even beyond what Cain had done. Lamech defies God's plan for marriage and marries two women, and he apparently kills two men. Sin doesn't go

away. It spreads and gets worse as more and more people are born, and more and more reject God.

Gen 4:17-24 – <sup>17</sup> And Cain knew his wife, and she conceived and bore Enoch. And he built a city, and called the name of the city after the name of his son-- Enoch. <sup>18</sup> To Enoch was born Irad; and Irad begot Mehujael, and Mehujael begot Methushael, and Methushael begot Lamech. <sup>19</sup> Then Lamech took for himself two wives: the name of one *was* Adah, and the name of the second *was* Zillah. <sup>20</sup> And Adah bore Jabal. He was the father of those who dwell in tents and have livestock. <sup>21</sup> His brother's name *was* Jubal. He was the father of all those who play the harp and flute. <sup>22</sup> And as for Zillah, she also bore Tubal-Cain, an instructor of every craftsman in bronze and iron. And the sister of Tubal-Cain *was* Naamah. <sup>23</sup> Then Lamech said to his wives: "Adah and Zillah, hear my voice; Wives of Lamech, listen to my speech! For I have killed a man for wounding me, Even a young man for hurting me. <sup>24</sup> If Cain shall be avenged sevenfold, Then Lamech seventy-sevenfold."
